2024: A year of analysis and take-away ideas

In this election year, IMCO focused on providing ideas and proposals to promote a more competitive country at the federal and local levels. It developed evidence and analysis to nurture the public agenda with key issues regarding Mexico's future. The following are highlights of this year's institutional milestones and achievements:



Economics:

- **IMCO is the local partner of the World Economic Forum (WEF)** in Mexico in conducting surveys for their reports and disseminating results related to Mexico.
- **IMCO's analyses were cited in the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD)** report "Economic Survey of Mexico", addressing key issues such as water, energy, the labor market, public finance and education.
- **IMCO contributed a chapter on energy in North America** to the Brookings Institution's USMCA Forward 2024 Report, which discussed the Brookings energy research and proposals.
- **IMCO participated in an open parliament session to discuss the Federal Expenditure Budget Project** on infrastructure investment and its relationship with economic growth, organized by the Budget and Public Account Commission of the Chamber of Deputies. The data was cited in the 2025 budget ruling. IMCO also participated in the roundtable on economic development organized by the same commission.
- **IMCO remains a leader in national and international public discussions on North American energy markets.** The institution presented its analyses and participated in dialogues on the status of the energy sector, national and regional infrastructure and the outlook for state-owned companies with the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), the Wilson Center, the Institute of International Finance, the U.S. Embassy in Mexico, the Japan External Trade Organization (JETRO) and the BlackRock investment fund, among others.
- **IMCO presented its comprehensive proposal for Mexico's Industrial Policy**, based on which it has held dialogues with the Ministry of Economy, the Economic Development Advisory Council (Consejo Asesor de Desarrollo Económico Regional y de Relocación de Empresas), as well as other local government representatives from Oaxaca, Querétaro and Chihuahua.
- **The institution is a key voice in the nearshoring agenda and Mexico's economic relations with the world.** Institutional research and perspectives were presented to the Inter-American Development Bank, the Development Bank of Latin America and the Caribbean (CAF), the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), the Commercial Service of the U.S. Embassy, the Consulate General of Mexico in Houston, the Aspen Institute Germany, the Mexican Association of Secretaries, Mexican Association of Secretaries of Economic Development (AMSDE), as well as other organizations and actors at the subnational level.

- IMCO participated in efforts to strengthen Mexico's economic relations. The institution was present at the **Americas Competitiveness Exchange** organized by the Organization of American States, which brought together leaders from more than twenty countries in the State of Michigan, with the purpose of promoting cooperation and exchanging ideas and projects. It also formed part of the **Global Advisory Group of the Konrad Adenauer Foundation** to discuss geopolitical risks and trends in the global economy.
- **IMCO's analysis of Mexico's economic outlook and risks** was presented to the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), the Bank for International Settlements (BIS), the embassies of the United States, Canada and Japan, Moody's sovereign team, Bank of America, BNP Paribás and Trans-National Research.
- **IMCO continues to promote proposals for fiscal responsibility and continues to promote fiscal federalism.** It was consulted by the Tax Foundation for a dialogue on the International Tax Competitiveness Index 2024. In addition, IMCO conducted an analysis on the efforts of state governments to generate their own resources, which was published by the University of Guadalajara.
- **IMCO developed research to provide evidence on strengthening regulatory frameworks and facilitated working groups** for decision makers in seven governments: Chiapas, Veracruz, Tabasco, Oaxaca, Quintana Roo, Yucatan and Campeche. This project was carried out as a subcontractor in the USAID-funded SURGES project.



Data analytics

- **IMCO maintains an active agenda of dialogue to promote the economic development of the entities through the State Competitiveness Index.** Currently, it has a relationship with 21 entities to analyze their performance and design public policies based on the evidence of the Index. This project serves as a basis for preparing development plans and monitoring key indicators for public policies.
- **IMCO continues to promote the Urban Competitiveness Index (ICU by its acronym in Spanish) with key local audiences.** This year it was presented to the business community of Chihuahua, during the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of Economic Development of the State of Chihuahua, A.C., and a dialogue was held with the Mayor and the Director of Economic Development and Competitiveness of that city. The Governors of Sonora, Sinaloa, Coahuila, and Culiacán highlighted the good results of the cities in their states. The mayors of Guaymas and Hermosillo also mentioned their results in interviews with the media.
- The Urban Competitiveness Index is cited in the document **Metrópolis de México 2020, prepared by Conapo, Sedatu and INEGI**, which contains the methodological update to modify the territorial delimitations of cities.
- This year, **ICU data was used to create the Radiografía Chilanga**, an index that analyzes 25 indicators for Mexico City's 16 municipalities. **Candidates for mayor used this data to develop proposals.**



Inclusive Society

- **IMCO data on the wage gap and women's participation in companies were cited in the package of reforms presented by President Claudia Sheinbaum** to move towards greater gender equality in the country.
- **IMCO is a leader in generating data, analysis and proposals on women's economic participation.** The institution provided gender equality data to organizations such as the International Finance Corporation (IFC), UNICEF, the Milken Institute, as well as the American Chamber of Commerce (AmCham), the British Chamber of Commerce, and the Embassies of Chile and the United Kingdom. **IMCO was also cited in the Guide Expanding Women's Financial Inclusion in Mexico by the Ministry of Finance with the World Bank.**
- **The area's research has been cited to support various federal law initiatives.** Among the 11 reform proposals that use the area's data, those that seek to extend paternity leave, promote the financial inclusion of women and end school dropout rates stand out, in addition to those presented by the President of Mexico for gender equality.
- In the legislative arena, **the team also participated in the dialogue tables regarding the discussion of the 2025 Federal Expenditure Budget Bill** on gender budgeting and was cited in the 2025 budget ruling. Likewise, the Women in the Economy Forum, organized by IMCO with the Senate Labor Commission to discuss proposals to close gender gaps was held. The Forum was attended by organizations such as the ILO, INMUJERES, IMSS, Oxfam and the British Embassy.
- **Workshops with a gender perspective were given to strengthen technical skills** at the Ministry of Economy and Labor of the state of Chiapas and the National Institute for Transparency, Access to Information and Data Protection (INAI by its acronym in Spanish), as well as to the media.
- **At the state level, data from the area was used to support initiatives and provide insight into the local landscape.** Examples include the Governor of Aguascalientes, the Secretary of Economy of Sinaloa, the Secretary of Economic Development of Mexico City and the Undersecretary of Education of Chihuahua.
- IMCO was part of the **10 for Education initiative**, which, from civil society, called on the **presidential candidates to present their proposals on education.**



Government

- **As a candidate, Claudia Sheinbaum presented her anti-corruption platform in which IMCO proposals were included.**

These were the ten projects with the greatest impact during the year:

1 [State Competitiveness Index 2024 \(ICE by its acronym in Spanish\)](#)



For the past 18 years, this index has been evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of Mexico's 32 states. In this edition, Mexico City is the most competitive entity, followed by Baja California Sur and Coahuila, while Oaxaca is the least competitive entity. This year, we analyze the main challenges of the nine entities that renewed governorships and the head of government of Mexico City, highlighting their performance in security and labor market indicators..

2 [Industrial Policy](#)



We analyze the current conditions of the country's industry and present specific proposals aimed at promoting Mexico's growth and development. In the last 20 years, the national value added to the production of manufacturing exports has stagnated, so it is necessary to implement an industrial policy that strengthens the integration of local companies with value chains and international markets.

3 [Women in business](#)



In partnership with Kiik Consultores, we analyzed more than 200 companies listed on Mexico's stock exchanges to measure the participation of women in senior management and on boards of directors. This edition concludes that women's participation in companies is stagnant, and in some cases, has regressed.

4 States with Gender Magnifying Glass



For the third consecutive year, Estados #ConLupaDeGénero was published: a tool that allows comparing the working conditions offered to women in the different states. In this edition, Mexico City is the best performing state, while Oaxaca is in last place.

5 Hacienda En La Mira



This year we released a report that, quarter by quarter, analyzes the situation of public finances at the federal level in order to identify progress and setbacks in more than 50 indicators of revenue, spending and debt of the federal public sector over the last 19 years (2006-2024) based on information from the Ministry of Finance and Public Credit.

6 Pemex and CFE En La Mira



Analyzing the energy market and the country's public finances is only possible if we put #EnLaMira the two main state-owned companies: Pemex and CFE. Through their financial and operating statements, each quarter we examine their situation in a summarized, clear and timely manner.

7 Nearshoring: The Impact on Foreign Direct Investment



Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) flows were analyzed for a set of 57 industrial activities, whose investment reception may be more associated with the trend of relocation of productive chains in Mexico. Although the trends and their causes are not yet clear, in 2023 FDI grew more in the sectors that are best associated with the relocation of global value chains.

8 Gas in the south-southeast



Natural gas is key to the energy sector transition and the promotion of economic and social development. In particular, improving competitiveness in the south-southeast of the country requires guaranteeing access to reliable, low-emission energy at competitive prices for all households and industries. Mexico needs accelerated investment in the entire natural gas value chain.

9 Compare Careers



This tool celebrates its tenth year of promoting competitive talent and generating information on economic prospects by career. In this edition, we found that Mexico is not training the talent it needs. Although there is a greater demand for technological skills in the labor market, the most popular careers at the state level continue to be Business Administration, Industrial Engineering, Law, Business, and Nursing.

10 Urban Competitiveness Index 2024.



This index measures the capacity of the 66 most important Mexican cities to generate, attract and retain talent and investment. This analysis is based on 35 indicators grouped into 6 clusters, which allows for a comprehensive evaluation of the factors that drive urban competitiveness. In this edition, the top-ranked Mexican cities stood out for the balance of their performance in structural factors linked to the labor market, economic diversification and public safety.
